Subject: Evaluation of Building the Right Support (BRS) – National Survey

To support the national programme to transform care for people with a learning, disability, autism or both, NHS England and its partners have commissioned an [evaluation](#) of the programme. This is being carried out by [The Strategy Unit](#), [ICF](#) (a health research and consultancy company); the [British Institute for Learning Disabilities](#) (BILD) and the [University of Birmingham](#).

The main aim of the evaluation is to learn about how effectively local areas are delivering the ambitions set out in Building the Right Support (BRS), to understand how we can improve quality and outcomes. Your feedback will play a valuable and vital role as the evaluation is particularly keen to identify and share good practice in order to drive the change that's needed.
