


# What's occurring In Learning Disability Nursing? Jonathan Beebee




### **Learning Disability Inpatient Services**



The numbers of learning disability nursing in secondary care have fallen sharply over the last fifteen years, with a lot of the fall between 2009 and 2013

Numbers have fallen by 47% from September 2009 from 5553 FTE to 2971 FTE. 25% of the drop took place between September 2009 and March 2013



# We know since the start of the 50,000 More Nurses Programme growth has focused on adult nursing – to detriment of other branches

Adult nursing is the only branch which has grown beyond the average since September 2019; by contrast Learning Disability is the only branch where numbers have fallen


### Our training numbers have increased sharply since 2018, after a drop following changes to bursaries

Pre-registration numbers have been at or over the 600 mark since 2020, after falling to under 350 in 2018



# The LTWP confirmed an increase of potentially up to 72% in LD nursing training places to 2031, with increases in places up to 2028/29 confirmed

It is also expected that by 2029 42% of places will be apprenticeships... compared to less than 5% now



### Where are we now



- The model for learning disability support has drastically changed
- The complexity of need is increasing due to changes in support, living longer, increase in some conditions, co-dependencies.
- Autism
- Substitution
- Primary and secondary care
- Number of Registered Nurses in Learning Disabilities continues to decline, number of student learning disabilities not recovering from 2016 numbers
- <u>But</u> it only matters that the numbers are going down if there is clarity about how many RNLDs are needed, what they are needed for, and where they are needed is known.
- There are around 3,000 RNLDs in the NHS in England, there are around 17,000 RNLDs on the NMC register. Where are they?
